

BIODIVERSITY EXTINCTION

Bribie Island's Internationally protected Fauna and Flora Sanctuary is at risk from unsustainable Population Growth, and inappropriate and unsustainable Development and Tourism marketing.

Bribie Island is the Jewel in Moreton Bay. It is an island encompassed by Pumicestone Passage and Moreton Bay - all of which is protected under the Ramsar Convention on Wetlands of International Importance, the Convention on the Conservation of Migratory Species (CMS), Marine Park and much is National Park.

Bribie Island has pristine freshwater lagoons and a honeycomb of freshwater aquifers that support the Island's fragile vegetation and wildlife.









NEW FEDERAL GOVT GRANTS FOR WATER MONITORING, TRAINING AND EQUIPMENT - SELF MANAGEMENT

Water monitoring ceased for a while, then in 2018
Water Monitoring continued with a Federal Govt grant for training and equipment

New sites were identified that included not only freshwater, but estuarine monitoring.

After the closure of the HLW Community Database, BIEPA keeps its own data and reports incidents and issues to local government.



During 2019-20-21 BIEPA has held regular field days for water monitoring teams to study local catchments






MARINE DEBRIS PROJECT
















TOTAL numbers captured by BIEPA for delivery to Prof Rob Capon's Research Team at the Institute for Molecular Bioscience at Uni of Qld:
